Issue 1. U.S.-China Military Cooperation: U.S. New Defense Strategy, China's National Defense Modernization United States China

January 5, 2012 Remarks by President Obama (Obama Announces New Defense Strategy)

Quote: "[...] meeting the challenges of our time cannot be the work of our military alone - or the United States alone. It requires all elements of our national power, working together in concert with our allies and our partners." "[...] our military will be leaner, but the world must know the United States is going to maintain our military superiority with armed forces that are agile, flexible and ready for the full range of contingencies and threats."

January 5, 2012 Remarks by Secretary of Defense Panetta (<u>Statement as Prepared by Secretary of Defense Leon E. Panetta on the Defense Strategic Guidance</u>)

Quote: "But even as our large-scale military campaigns recede, the United States still faces a complex and growing array of security challenges across the globe, challenges that call for a reshaping of America's defense priorities, focusing on the continuing threat of violent extremism, proliferation of lethal weapons and materials, the destabilizing behavior of Iran and North Korea, the rise of new powers across Asia, and the dramatic changes in the Middle East." "Even facing these considerable pressures, including the requirement of the Budget Control Act to reduce defense spending by \$487 billion over 10 years, I do not believe that we must choose between national security and fiscal responsibility."

 January 6, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (Pentagon plan changes game in Asia)

Quote: "According to the officials of Pentagon, the changes in strategy are mainly aimed at Iran and China. In front of such a US strategic adjustment, China should remain sober. Since it has become a firm strategic target of the US, its efforts to improve Sino-US relations have proved incapable of offsetting US worries over its rise. China can only use its strength to gain friendship from the US from now on. The US and China are carrying out competition unprecedented in history. Under the aegis of globalization, the two are closely linked economically, which makes it impossible for the US to fully contain China. Dealing with the US containment attempts should be one of China's diplomatic strategic goals. China should unite with all possible forces and keep certain strategic initiatives against the US." "The US takes China's anti-access capabilities as another target. China should come up with countermeasures. It should strengthen its long-range strike abilities and put more deterrence on the US. The US must realize that it cannot stop the rise of China and that being friendly to China is in its utmost interests." "China should try to avoid a new cold war with the US, but by no means should it give up its peripheral security in exchange for US' ease in Asia."

January 9, 2012 Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference (Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference on January 9, 2012)

Quote: "China's strategic intention is clear, open and transparent. China sticks fast to the path of peaceful development and upholds the independent foreign policy of peace as well as the defence policy that is defensive in nature. Our national defence modernization serves the need of national security and development and plays a positive role in safeguarding regional peace and stability, without posing a threat to any country. The charges against China in this document (U.S. Defense Strategic Guidance) are groundless and untrustworthy. China will look seriously into the document. To maintain peace, stability and prosperity in the Asia Pacific serves the common interests of all countries within the region. We hope that the US will play a more constructive role to this end."



January 27, 2012 Remarks by U.S. Pacific Command, Admiral Willard (Asia-Pacific US Military Overview)

Quote: "The military relationship with China has been carried on throughout 2011, and now into 2012, at a strategic level." "Advancing the military relationship in other ways at the operational and tactical levels – getting our two militaries more acquainted with one another through operations or through counterpart visits – has not advanced. So there are – and part of that is a difference in philosophy regarding what mil-to-mil should consist of between our two countries, and part of it is the trust factor, and part of it is what China views as impediments to advancing the military relationship. All of those challenges need to be worked through, and we use the strategic level dialogue to, hopefully, do that. So I would say there is potential there. And I am gratified that at the strategic level the dialogue has persisted. I am not satisfied that the military relationship is where it needs to be."

January 12, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (China should stay calm, alert about US strategy adjustments)

Quote: "China should stay alert and calm in dealing with the United States' strategic adjustment. Facing this strategic adjustment, China should be prepared for unexpected development. It ought to stick to its own road. The United States is afraid of China's prosperity and takes every means to disturb China's development. [...] The United States is also afraid that China will have a good external environment and therefore it takes every means to create troubles between China and other countries, pull other countries to its side to confront China, and set barriers on China's development road." "What the United States is afraid of most is China's powerful national defense. It is reasonable and legal for China to develop its national defense. If the United States regards China as a threat, it should first do something to relieve China's concerns. That is China's reply for the shift of its military focus to the Asia-Pacific Region."

January 18, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (US should take rational view on China's military development)

Quote: "China has increased its investment in national defense and army construction since last decade. This is a compensation for the past, and an adjustment corresponding with the elevation of China's international position and the expansion of national interest. [...] As a regional power, China does not solve disputes of land and maritime rights with bordering countries through military means, instead, it solves the boundary problem with most countries through peaceful negotiations. [...] China is exploring a road of peaceful development for the newly emerging great power, and we are confident to avoid the lessons in the rising of historically traditional great powers, such as the military expansion and military conflicts with hegemonic powers. We hope America could treat China and Chinese military troops in a rational way, and jointly create a new road of peaceful coexistence of countries with China."

 January 4, 2012 Remarks by Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs Campbell (Remarks to the Media on Departure at Beijing Capital Airport)

Quote: "We reviewed the schedule ahead and I think both sides acknowledged how important the year 2012 will be in U.S.-China relations and the importance we place on maintaining steady progress in our bilateral relations."

January 26, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily Press Briefing</u>)

Quote: "I don't think our policy with regard to China has changed. We are intent on cooperating wherever we can around the world, encouraging a peaceful and strong, cooperative relationship. We do a huge amount of business around the world."

January 6, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (<u>Transformation needs courage</u>, <u>wisdom</u>)

Quote: "Both China and the United States are looking for new ways for cooperation and it will not be a simple process of adapting to each other. Both sides have no 'existing mode' to refer to, and the competition for interest contains potential risks. In order to manage risks, avoid tension, control crisis and reduce misunderstandings, both sides must keep strengthening and expanding their current cooperation mechanisms. In order to find out new cooperation modes as soon as possible, both countries must show their courage and wisdoms. In order to eliminate the imbalance of the global economic development, cope with the climate change and solve global issues including the aging of population, public health, food safety issue and water resource safety, global coordination and cooperation are needed urgently."

January 11, 2012 Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference (Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference on January 11, 2012)

Quote: "Responsible US political figures should recognize that cooperation between China and the US serves US' interests and they need to have the vision, the will and the capability to safeguard and promote equality-based and mutually beneficial China-US relations."

January 12, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (<u>Disputes on values cannot hide</u> the truth)

Quote: "Value differences are not ubiquitous in Sino-US relations and their damage is very limited. Instead, the more influential factors are frictions and competition in areas such as economy, environmental protection and geopolitics. However, as the US gradually loses its advantages in these aspects, it becomes more and more accustomed to using 'superior values' to cover up its deficiencies. In the past few years, the US has made good use of ideological disputes to trouble China for the purpose of seeking leverage in economy and politics." "The biggest structural tension between China and the US is China's rise. China should bear this in mind. China is trying to make its development beneficial to the world, but the US feels differently. The rise of China will still face threats in the future. The US attacking China in terms of ideology will get double results with half the effort."



 January 31, 2012 Remarks by Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs Campbell (Keynote Address to Korea Society Gala Dinner)

Quote: "And of course we recognize in the United States that one of the most important relationships for us to get correct, for us to get right, is our relationship between the United States and China. We recognize quite clearly that every country in Asia wants a better relationship with China, and we support that. And any strategy that the United States implements that does not have that at its core will fail. So we understand that this is not a matter of geo-strategy, it is a matter of geography. And we too want a strong, constructive, deep partnership with China. This is our destiny, it is our commitment. It is a necessity that the United States and China work together in peace; that we compete, but that we compete in ways that bring prosperity and peace to Asia as a whole."

 January 17, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (Actions speak louder than words)

Quote: "Three factors contributed to the improvement in China-US relations in 2011: mutual commitment, multi-function mechanisms, and increasing interdependence. [...] Whether and how the above-mentioned three forces will function in the year of 2012, will most likely be affected by the following two variables. The first variable is the upcoming presidential election in the US. [...] an increasing number of people in the US have begun to view China as a threat to the US economy. Predictably, 'China bashing' will be popular among the presidential candidates." "The second variable is the gap in perception between the two peoples over each other's strategic intentions. Many US citizens view the prospect of China surpassing the US in GDP within a decade with growing concern. A number of mainstream strategists in Washington have shifted to an alarmist tone recently, arguing that the US must stand tougher than before in many areas in which China's interests oppose those of the US. Such a perception is mirrored in China, where a number of mainstream strategists and the majority of the general public have interpreted the US' strategic shift to Asia-Pacific as an attempt to contain China. The good news is that policymakers in Washington realize that a rising China is good for the US. Vice-President Joe Biden recently said: 'A successful China can make America more prosperous, not less."

• January 31, 2012 Global Times Editorial (<u>US should abandon zero sum mentality</u>)

Quote: "They should first realize that the rise of China is inevitable as long as China can maintain a peaceful development environment. In this sense, the most effective way for the US to contain its development is to damage the peaceful environment in China and bring it into chaos." "A chaotic China will bring only harm to the following generations of Americans. And the US should be clear that China is not easily brought to chaos, despite the Internet being full of diverse opinions and mass incidents continually happening in China. [...] It is very possible for the US to share the rise of China, which in truth might not really bring an absolute win-win situation. But it will not be a zero-sum game either, unless both China and the US desperately want to go back to the 20th century."



Issue 3. Economic Cooperation: China's Unfair Trading Practices

January 25, Remarks by President Obama (Remarks by the President in State of the Union Address)

Quote: "[...] it's getting more expensive to do business in places like China. Meanwhile, America is more productive." "I will go anywhere in the world to open new markets for American products. And I will not stand by when our competitors don't play by the rules. We've brought trade cases against China at nearly twice the rate as the last administration - and it's made a difference. Over a thousand Americans are working today because we stopped a surge in Chinese tires. But we need to do more. It's not right when another country lets our movies, music, and software be pirated. It's not fair when foreign manufacturers have a leg up on ours only because they're heavily subsidized. Tonight, I'm announcing the creation of a Trade Enforcement Unit that will be charged with investigating unfair trading practices in countries like China. There will be more inspections to prevent counterfeit or unsafe goods from crossing our borders. And this Congress should make sure that no foreign company has an advantage over American manufacturing when it comes to accessing financing or new markets like Russia. Our workers are the most productive on Earth, and if the playing field is level, I promise you - America will always win."

 Quote: "Fast economic development has become the biggest advantage that China has when dealing with the US. The US can hardly provoke China in the economic field, unlike its developing military strength which gives excuses for the West to suppress China. The more the two focus on economic competition, the more the situation will tilt China's way. The growth and decline in economic strength is the starting point for national competition as well as its destination. It reflects national tendencies."

The Chinese side has made proposals on the furtherance of China-US economic cooperation and trade and hopes that the two sides will meet each other half way."

 January 19, 2012 Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference (Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference on January 19, 2012)

Quote: "In principle, we hold that the parties should implement the consensus reached by heads of state at the G20 Cannes Summit in a joint effort to ensure adequate IMF resources to cope with the current international financial crisis. At the same time, we hope all parties speed up domestic approval procedures so as to complete the quota reform on time and fundamentally guarantee the funding resources of the IMF."

January 31, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (<u>U.S. shots at China trade may backfire</u>)

Quote: "U.S. politicians have aimed a barrage of critiques at China's trade policies recently but the shots from the crisis-plagued economy of the United States are likely to miss their target, or worse, backfire. [...] China has not run out of ammunition to cope with the chaos, although retaliation or the abuse of trade remedy measures have never been at the forefront of the country's arsenals. [...] Accusing China of subsidizing exports is based more on self-reinforcing ideas than on calmly conceived measuring. The land and loans that Chinese companies get owes to their merits in the appraisal system." "Being each other's second-largest trading partner, China and the United States should set sail on the same boat toward the shared boom."



Issue 4. Human Rights: Human Rights in Tibet and China, Freedom of Expression on the Internet, China's Denunciation of Dalai Lama United States China

January 9, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily Press Briefing</u>)

Quote: "We're seriously concerned by reports that three more Tibetans have self-immolated over the past few days. Since March, this brings the count to some 15 Tibetan Buddhist self-immolations in China. We have consistently – the U.S. Government has consistently and directly raised with the Chinese Government this issue of Tibetan self-immolation. These actions clearly represent enormous anger, enormous frustration with regard to the severe restrictions on human rights, including religious freedom inside China. And we have called the Chinese Government policies counterproductive and have urged the Chinese Government to have a productive dialogue to loosen up in Tibet and allow journalists and diplomats and other observers to report accurately and to respect the human rights of all of their citizens."

January 18, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily Press Briefing</u>)

Quote: "[...] we seem to have an increasing trend of crackdown, we – forced disappearances, extralegal detentions, arrests and convictions of human rights activists, lawyers, religious leaders, ethnic minorities in China. So we are being quite forthright with the Chinese Government about our concerns that we are in, and we seem to be in a period of crackdown [...]." "I think our message to the Chinese Government on these issues is the same message that we give around the world when we have human rights concerns – that governments are stronger when they protect the human rights of their people, and when they allow for peaceful dissent."

January 24, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily</u> Press Briefing)

Quote: "We are seriously concerned by reports of violence, continuing heightened tensions in the Tibetan area of China, including reports that security forces in Sichuan province have been opening fire on protestors, killing some and injuring others. As you know, we have repeatedly urged the Chinese Government to address its counterproductive policies in the Tibetan areas, which have created tensions and threatened the unique religious, cultural, and linguistic identity of the Tibetan people, and we urge the Chinese Government to engage in constructive dialogue with the Dalai Lama or his representatives as a means to address Tibetan concerns."

January 18, 2012 Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference (Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Liu Weimin's Regular Press Conference on January 18, 2012)

Quote: "Dalai is by no means a pure religious figure, but rather the mastermind of an organized political clique that has long engaged in separatist activities driven by its platform and a political exile under the disguise of religion. The Chinese Government opposes the international activities of Dalai in any capacity or name and opposes political and official figures of relevant country getting in contact with Dalai in any form or name."

January 29, 2012 Global Times Editorial (<u>Human Rights award misses point of China's social progress</u>)

Quote: "The Chinese public also enjoys growing political rights. It is true that Chinese people are more conscious of protecting their rights. However, that is not because there is more oppression, but because the public has become more aware of its rights in various aspects. But it is funny that when talking about human rights, the West usually turns a blind eye to China's progress as a whole by focusing and exaggerating on a few individual efforts. It will be much better if Western observers and media can take a long-sighted view of China's overall progress in improving human rights rather than lose sight of the woods for the trees."



January 24, 2012 State Department Office of the Spokesperson Press Statement (Statement by Special Coordinator for Tibetan Issues Maria Otero)

Quote: "As United States Special Coordinator for Tibetan Issues, I am gravely concerned by reports of violence and continuing heightened tensions in Tibetan areas of China [...]." "The U.S. Government repeatedly has urged the Chinese government to address the counterproductive policies in Tibetan areas that have created tensions and that threaten the distinct religious, cultural and linguistic identity of the Tibetan people."

January 27, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily Press Briefing</u>)

Quote: "[...] the United States Government has repeatedly called on the Chinese Government to provide information on the whereabouts of all 20 of the Uighur asylum seekers, to allow access to them by international agencies, and to treat them in accordance with international human rights obligations and commitments."

January 27, 2012 State Department Daily Press Briefing (<u>State Department Daily Press Briefing</u>)

Quote: "[...] as the Secretary's made clear on numerous occasions, we're strongly committed to protecting fundamental freedoms of expression, assembly, association online. As the Secretary said in her internet freedom speech, the choices that private companies make have an impact on how information flows or doesn't flow on the internet and mobile networks. They also have an impact on what governments can and can't do and on people on the ground. Smart companies need to develop broad principles that guide their action, and in the tech field this includes principles on freedom of expression, privacy, criteria on when to avoid working with governments that use technology to become more efficient at committing human rights violations, these kinds of things." "We're not going to be dictating to this one company or another. We're setting out the general principles. As I said, there are many companies out there that make these decisions without being transparent, either to their users or to the world. Twitter's been upfront about what they're doing. I think we have to see how it works."

January 29, 2012 Global Times Editorial (<u>Dalai group not keeping Tibet's interests</u> at heart)

Quote: "The Dalai Lama has been abusing his religious reputation in the Tibetan areas to acquire unspeakable interests for his exile group. His selfish and politically motivated acts have risked the well-being of the general Tibetan public and will eventually become his own downfall. The Dalai Lama is merely a manipulator representing the exile group. To them, ordinary people living in the Tibetan areas are nothing but tools, and they will continuously exploit them, even exposing them to great danger."

January 5, 2012 Remarks by Under Secretary of Defense for Policy Flournoy

Quote: "We continue to evolve our presence and posture in the Asia-Pacific region both to deal with challenges that are emerging and opportunities. Quote: "The United States condemns in the strongest possible terms the escalation of the Syrian regime's violent and brutal attacks on its own people." "The regime has failed to meet its commitments to the Arab League to halt its acts of violence, withdraw its military forces from residential areas, allow journalists and monitors to operate freely and release prisoners arrested because of the current unrest." "The violence must end, so that a new period of democratic transition can begin. [...] the international community should send a clear message of support to the Syrian people: we stand with you. The Arab League is backing a resolution that calls on the international community to support its ongoing efforts, because the status quo is unsustainable. The longer the Assad regime continues its attacks on the Syrian people and stands in the way of a peaceful transition, the greater the concern that instability will escalate and spill over throughout the region."

January 31, 2012 Remarks by Secretary of State Hillary Clinton (Remarks at a United Nations Security Council Session on the situation in Syria)

Quote: "The United States urges the Security Council to back the Arab League's demand that the Syrian Government immediately stop all attacks against civilians and guarantee the freedom of peaceful demonstrations. In accordance with the Arab League's plan, Syria must also release all arbitrarily detained citizens, return its military and security forces to their barracks, allow full and unhindered access for monitors, humanitarian workers, and journalists. And we urge the Security Council to back the Arab League's call for an inclusive, Syrian-led political process to effectively address the legitimate aspirations and concerns of Syria's people, conducted in an environment free from violence, fear, intimidation, and extremism."

• January 19, 2012 People's Daily Online Editorial (<u>US sends subtle signal to Iran</u>)

Quote: "The tense situation of the Strait of Hormuz once again revealed the delicate relationship and difference of views between the United States and Israel. If Iran develops nuclear weapon, it will turn into the biggest threat to Israel. [...] For the United States, the Iran issue is like a needle on its back. It indeed wants to overthrow the Iran government, but objective conditions do not allow it to do it." "In the big strategic

picture, a war in the Strait of Hormuz will affect the whole world, and therefore, the

United States has to think it twice."

China engages in energy and resource cooperation with Africa [...] which completely conforms to international practice and market rules. While meeting the reasonable energy demand of China, such cooperation also [...] boosts the common development of relevant countries and regions. We hope the outside world can view China-Africa cooperation in an objective and fair manner."

Quote: "Oil is the economic lifeline of both Sudan and South Sudan. We urge the two sides to stay calm and exercise restraint, avoid taking excessive action, continue to cooperate with the African Union in its mediation efforts in order to settle their disputes through negotiation at an early date for the benefit of both countries and both peoples. China hopes that the governments of the two countries can honor their commitment and protect the legitimate rights and interests of relevant Chinese companies and other partners."

January 30, 2012 Global Times Editorial (<u>China faces tough calls in Iran showdown</u>)

Quote: "[...] the Iran issue involves so much of China's interests that no other previous international conflict is comparable in this regard. Ten percent of China's oil is imported from Iran, and China cannot stay aloof from the affair." "The US may make risky moves at some key time in order to prevent China from acquiring oil from Iran, a possibility that cannot be ruled out. China should be well prepared for the situation to escalate. When its rights are unfairly stepped upon, due countermeasures should be in place."

Quote: "The result of the Taiwan leadership election has been revealed. The other is a commitment and demonstrated willingness by the DPRK to come back into compliance with its international obligations and its commitments from 2005, so both of those are still on the table from our perspective, so our position certainly hasn't changed."

 January 4, 2012 Remarks by Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs Campbell (Remarks to the Media on Departure at Beijing Capital Airport)

Quote: "On North Korea, I think the United States and China share strong determination to maintain peace and stability. I think we both underscored how important it will be over the course of the coming months, to maintain very close contact between Washington and Beijing. And I indicated that we would be closely monitoring the situation there and that we urged all parties to cautiously deal with the situation and to refrain from any provocations."

Quote: "With regard to whether the United States provides nutritional assistance to the DPRK, our decision will be based on our assessment of need and our ability to monitor what we might be able to provide. We have not resolved the issues that we have either in terms of what we would consider appropriate to give, particularly the issue of giving things that cannot be diverted to other uses or ending up on a banquet table and the issues associated with monitoring. With regard to getting back to the Six-Party table, we've made very clear in the conversations that we've had bilaterally what it will take to get us back to the table, including continuing the dialogue with South Korea and real good-faith steps to come to show willingness to talk about their nuclear program and come back into compliance."

Quote: "We always hold that the Talks is the effective mechanism to realize denuclearization on the Peninsula and maintain peace and stability of the Peninsula and Northeast Asia. We hope parties concerned will step up engagement and dialogue, enhance mutual trust and create favorable conditions for the resumption of the Sixparty Talks."

China hopes that all parties will do more to maintain and promote peace and stability on the Peninsula. The Chinese side will continue to support the north and south of the Peninsula in improving their relations through dialogue in a bid to push forward reconciliation and cooperation. The ROK side expressed appreciation of the huge efforts made by the Chinese side and the expectation that the Chinese side would continue to play an active role."

Quote: "The US, Japan and the ROK are important parties to Korean Peninsular affairs and members of the Six-Party Talks. It is in the common interests of all parties, the US, Japan and the ROK included, to safeguard peace and stability on the Peninsula. We hope the three countries play an active and constructive role in this regard."

Quote: "China has provided necessary assistance to the DPRK within its capacity, which has contributed to the DPRK's economic and social development. We also welcome continued assistance from other parties and the international community to the DPRK."

Quote: "Admittedly, verifiable denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula in a peaceful manner is a major goal of the six-party talks." "Strengthening contacts, dialogues and mutual trust and laying the foundation for restarting the six-party talks as soon as possible are wise and responsible choices for all parties."
